## California wildfires

[Episcopal Relief & Development](#) is partnering with the dioceses of Northern California and Los Angeles to provide emergency support for those impacted by deadly wildfires. The assistance includes food, gasoline, masks and other critical supplies, as well as emergency housing and the storage of belongings.

The Episcopal Diocese of Northern California has established a core disaster response team in Chico, CA, west of Paradise, to assess and respond to emergency needs of people who have been impacted by the fires. The diocese is working to provide emergency housing and shelter, food, masks, gasoline, and other basic supplies to those in need. The team is also arranging for storage of recovered belongings in short-term storage units.

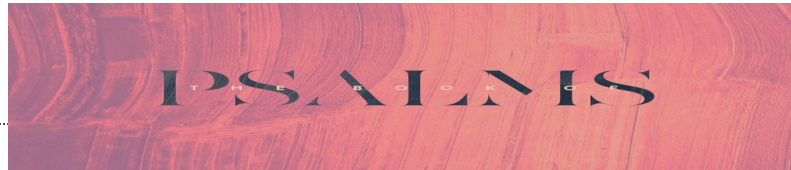
## Junior Warden Reflections

Advent literally means "coming." We wait for the coming. Our whole life seems to be periods of waiting for something. Whether its waiting for school to end, waiting for work to be over, waiting for the bus, waiting for your turn in line, we seem to spend a great amount of time mentally and physically waiting for something. So, here we are in the 21st. century waiting for Christmas. I, personally, wait for Christmas to be over. It's not my favorite time of the year. However, as a Christian, I see a big difference between Christmas and the birth of baby Jesus. An no, I am not going to talk about the commercialism of the holiday or how St. Nicholas overshadows the incarnate birth.

I try and imagine this small baby born in a manger (which, by the way, is a trough where you put the animals food). There is Mary with her child. Narratives describe this scene with oxen, donkeys, cows and other animals. Then there is Joseph, Mary's husband, kneeling there looking at the new born; and like most new fathers he is most likely smiling and talking to the new life as fathers do. Taking his little fingers, saying things like goo goo and gaa gaa to the child or whatever the equivalent is in Hebrew. I guess this is a different image than some imagine. Jesus was, however, a baby who cried, nursed and needed diaper changes. We don't know his first words. We don't know much about Jesus growing up. One of the Gospels that didn't make it into the Bible, talked about Jesus at a middle school age getting angry with this playmates and did something mean to me. The Jesus of the Bible, for the most part, centers around his young adult life, his ministry, and his fulfilling of the prophecy of the coming of the Messiah. So we wait. Advent is upon us. "Come thou long expected Jesus."

What's important to me is that this birth signaled a new era, a reformation in the way people began to view God. This birth for me symbolizes a new focus in human interaction. The God that Jews worship becomes a repository of Love. Jesus was born, but more important than His birth was His purpose. He entered the world to love, heal, and forgive, and to teach others how to do the same. I see this season as waiting for that moment which stresses that our God is a God of love who asks us to love each other. "For greater love hath no man than he lay down his life for his friends."

And that is what that little baby laying there in that manger did for us. He gave his life to enable us to love, heal and forgive each other... So . . . Merry Christmas little baby Jesus!

## Angel in the Kitchen

For all my cooking friends, this recipe can be modified to whatever favorite box cake mix you like.

I recently made cookies with Red Velvet cake mix, strawberry cake mix and lemon cake mix and dusted them with powder sugar insteading.

If you like soft cookies, this will be your favorite recipe. And it's so easy to make!

### Carrot Cake Cookies with Walnuts

#### Cookie Ingredients

1 carrot cake mix  
2 eggs  
1/3 cup oil  
1 cup chopped walnuts

#### Frosting

1 pkg 8 oz. cream cheese, softened  
1/2 cup (1stick) unsalted butter, softened  
3 cups powdered sugar plus more for thickening  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts to garnish



#### Instructions

Heat oven to 375. Mix cookie ingredients together. Roll cookies into golf-ball sized balls and place them onto cookie sheet. Cook for 7-9 minutes or until the edges start to brown. Dough will be firm but sticky. After taking cookies out of the oven, leave them on the cookie sheet to cool and continue baking.

**Recipe Notes:** Cool completely, then add frosting and sprinkles, or dust with powdered sugar. For chocolate cake mix cookies, roll your balls of dough through a pile of powdered sugar before baking.
