A Message from Father Martin

We have an exciting Fall Season ahead here at St. Andrew's.

Sunday, September 10 - Open House / Welcoming Sunday

Plan to attend (bring friends!) for Worship at 10 am followed by an Ice Cream Social. Sunday, September 24 - Alcoholism Awareness Sunday

Special guest John Wasielewski will speak during our 10 am worship and will have resources during refreshment time. (See more about John in this Piper.) Alcoholism is the major disease in our society that we never talk about. It is not a moral failing or a cause for shame but a treatable disease.

Sunday, October 1 – Blessing of the Animals

We will remember St. Francis of Assisi and bless pets outdoors, weather permitting. You are welcome to bring a photo of your pet if you prefer, or a photo of a pet no longer with you.

Sunday, November 12

Bishop Lucinda Ashby is coming to St. Andrew's on Sunday, November 12 for a Parish Visitation. A key part of a bishop's Visitation is to strengthen the ministries of the congregation through preaching and Confirmation / Reception / Reaffirmation of Baptismal vows. The Book of Common Prayer defines Confirmation as "the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop." (p. 860, see also p. 412)

There are four orders of ministry, which all stem from our baptismal promises: lay persons, bishops, priests, deacons (BCP. 855). Confirmation is a mature commitment to the responsibilities of baptism and a public affirmation of one's personal understanding and faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. The Confirmation service in the Book of Common Prayer speaks and prays of "renewing", "sending forth", "strengthening", empowering", "sustaining", "continuing", "increasing", "being led by the Holy Spirit" in the service which God sets before each of us, daily, as baptized Christians in the world. Confirmation therefore is not an end goal, for which one studies and achieves competence. It is a beginning point or commissioning - entering into mature Christian ministry.

Introducing our Speaker for Alcoholism Awareness Sunday Sunday, September 24 – 10 am service

John Wasielewski is a certified Substance Use Disorder Certified Counselor (SUDCC) with a BA in Human Services. He works as an Intensive Outpatient Counselor for Sobriety Works in Santa Cruz, providing 3x weekly group counseling services for up to twelve clients per session. He has five years of personal recovery from Alcohol Use Disorder as well as five years of experience working as a counselor in the field of addiction treatment.

He began his journey in the field working at Janus of Santa Cruz as a counselor for DUI classes and quickly began taking on other roles such as case manager, IOP counselor, and eventually Residential Treatment Counselor. He joined Sobriety Works in late 2020 as an Admissions counselor and transitioned back to being a group counselor in January, 2023. He is trained in Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy (CBT), Motivational Interviewing (MI), Trauma-Informed Care, and is a certified SMART Recovery Facilitator. John's long-term ambitions include getting his Master's degree and subsequent licensure in Clinical Social Work.

He is particularly excited to give this talk at St. Andrews Church as he went to preschool there and has very fond memories of the church during his upbringing. John struggled with alcohol and other drug use for several years after high school that resulted in lost friendships, family relationship strain, and a spiritual void that could only be filled by understanding that a force greater than himself could put him on the path to recovery.

He attended a residential treatment program in April 2018 that put him on the path to salvation. May 27th, 2018, is currently the date that John last drank alcohol, with hope and support from his higher power, he hopes that date will remain static so he can continue helping others who struggle with the same afflictions.

Since we believe that there is one Lord, one faith, and one baptism (Ephesians 4, & BCP p. 299), Confirmation in the Episcopal Church is not a declaration that the Episcopal Church is the best or only center of Christian ministry. Confirmation in the Episcopal Church simply means that one is ministering in and through this part of the Body of Christ. No one must denounce or repudiate their earlier ministries in another denomination, and those confirmed in other denominations which have the historic tradition of Sacramental Confirmation are "received" rather than re-confirmed. Those adults who were confirmed much earlier (as preteens perhaps) have the opportunity to 'Reaffirm their Baptismal Promises' and to receive the laying on of hands in blessing.

Therefore, I call each adult member of St. Andrew's to prayerfully consider if this is the time to present yourself for Confirmation / Reception / Reaffirmation. You are already in position to serve God and God's people through your family, work, community and congregational service. Is it now time to affirm and mark as your calling these ministries begun in Baptism and to be strengthened by the Holy Spirit through the apostolic authority of Christ's Church. represented by the Bishop?

Preparation will take place in September and October. Please call me so that meetings may be arranged.

This is perfect for this time of year when lots of apples are ripening.

One Bowl Apple Cake

Ingredients:

2 eggs

1-1/2 cups sugar (or a little less if you like)

2 heaping teaspoons cinnamon

1/2 cup canola oil

6 medium apples, diced

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking soda

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, mix eggs, sugar, cinnamon, and oil. Peel and slice apples and add to mixture in bowl (coating as you go to keep apples from turning brown). Mix together the flour and baking soda. Add to ingredients in bowl and stir until all flour is absorbed by wet ingredients. Pour into a greased 9X13 cake pan. Bake for about 55 minutes. Check at 45 minutes. It may be done.

HeeHeeHee!!!

A little boy came home eating a big candy bar. Seeing the candy bar, his mother remembered he had already spent all his allowance money. Surprised, she asked him where he got it. "I bought it at the store with the dollar you gave me," he said. "But that dollar was for Sunday School," his mother replied. Smiling, the boy said, "I know, Mom, but the Pastor met me at the door and got me in for free!"

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Wrong! 2016 attempted genocide of Rohingya in Myanmar, 2014 continuing attempt of genocide of the Uyghur people in China, and 2003 in the Sudan, 2002 in the Congo, 1996 in Zaire, 1992 Bosnia and Herzegovina, and the list goes on and on. I didn't even mention the Native Americans in our/their country. Currently in Egypt there are 18 Jews left. Twelve live in Alexandria. The synagogue in Alexandria was recently restored and three Jews attended the ceremony. The government keeps a watchful eye on them.

However, back to Joseph. One important lesson that I learned from his story is forgiveness and a family's love. I also learned how past mistakes can live with you until you resolve them. All through the story of Joseph was his desire to reconcile with his brothers, and his love of his family. Joseph named his two sons from his Egyptian wife Asenath, Manasseh (meaning to forget) and Ephraim (to be fruitful).

Both were Hebrew names. Both became leaders of tribes of Israel, both were eventually adopted by Jacob. When I read the story of Joseph, or when I have seen the musical, I am reminded at the end, that through forgiveness love triumphs, and it makes me feel good inside.

My wish in life, before He comes to take me away, is that I can find the strength to forgive those who have hurt me. I would hate to leave this world harboring negative feelings about others. In the meantime, I think I will see if Joseph, the musical, is playing somewhere close.

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Thoughts from Steve



. . . and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamoat

The story of Joseph in Genesis is one that I have read many times. I have also read the story written by Flavius Josephus (a Roman Jewish historian, 37AD). I have watched many movies made about Joseph and read a few of the many books written about his story. I also helped direct the musical Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat three times. This musical was the first one written by Andrew Lloyd Webber. He wrote it for church school performances. He followed this with another musical Jesus Christ Superstar which launched his career.

Joseph was the son of Jacob and Rachel and was Jacob's favorite son as he loved Rachel more than his other three wives. Benjamin was his other son from Rachel. In the story of Joseph, he is sold into slavery by jealous brothers, accused of rape, sent to prison in Egypt, interprets the Pharaoh's dreams, becomes governor of all of Egypt, given the name of Zaphnath-Paaneah and a wife Asenath who was the daughter of an Egyptian Priest. Scholars debate the translation of his Egyptian name. Jerome in translating the Vulgate Bible, calls him Salvator Mundi, savior of the world.

Joseph (Zaphnath-Paaneah) invites his father Jacob and sons to live in Egypt after pardoning his brothers for selling him. All is going great for Jacob and his family. Joseph dies. Over time fewer Pharaohs remember Joseph and began viewing the number of Israelites and their prosperity as a threat and eventually they are enslaved. 300 years pass until Moses leads them out of Egypt.

Moses is said to be the author of Genesis written circa 1400 BC. That is the Reader's Digest version of the story. The lessons of the Joseph story are many: forgiveness, hope, a fathers love enduring, brothers plagued by their wrongdoing, the eventual good that results for Jacob and his family, and God's ability to communicate through Joseph (the brothers didn't listen, the Pharaoh did).

History is full of rulers who fear groups that become strong. King Philip and Pope Clement eradicated the Knights Templar, Hitler tried to eradicate the Jews, the Spanish government killed 96% of the indigenous population of Hispaniola (Haiti and the Dominican Republic), the Moriori genocide in New Zealand, Russian genocide of the Circassian population, Armenian genocide by the Ottoman empire, and many more. You think that was in the past, it can't happen today.
