

Dear Friends,

Our Lenten season for spiritual refreshment and renewal is early this year. Ash Wednesday – the beginning of Lent – will be on Wednesday, February 14. (Yes, that is also Valentine's Day.) We will offer two services of Ashes and Holy Communion – at 12 Noon and 7:00 pm. To make a good beginning for our Lenten "fast", all are invited to our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, February 13, 5:00 to 6:30 pm in our Parish Hall. Thank you to Cathy Newfield and all who have signed up to help.

We will offer a Lenten Supper and Discussion series on from 5:00 to 6:30 pm on Wednesday evenings: February 21; 28, March 6, 13; 20. Please sign up to bring a simple main course or salad or bread. Our theme will be Hope: according to the Bible, in our personal lives, relationships, church and nation. Invite friends and neighbors. I have ordered devotional booklets to be picked up hopefully on the First Sunday in Lent (February 18). This year we will have copies of Forward Day by Day for each household to use.

On a different topic, we had a good Annual Meeting on January 21. Please pick up your updated Parish Directory and Annual Meeting Reports if you have not done so already. Sheryl Mello, Judyth Suttle and John Woolliscroft were elected to the Vestry. Rochelle Kelly was confirmed as Vestry Delegate to Diocesan Convention. 2023 Financial Reports and our 2024 Parish Budget were received and discussed. Parish activities for 2024 were discussed – see Rochelle's article in this Piper. And I announced the appointment of Rochelle Kelly as Senior Warden for 2024.

In thinking of our own spiritual growth and renewal and that of our St. Andrew's parish community, remember with me Jesus' parable of the seed growing secretly (Mark 4:26-29): "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

We do what we can to nurture our spiritual lives and to remember Jesus's Way of Love – prayer, Bible, worship, serving, resting, caring for others. And we trust that God's Spirit will move and grow in our lives as we do so. Similarly, we worship and serve, welcome one another and enjoy the Grace of the Lord here through St. Andrew's, and we trust that God will bring the harvest that God seeks to bring through us.

May God bless us all with a holy and uplifting Lenten season.

Thoughts from a Member of the Parish

I miss my sailboat. It was a 28 foot, Islander sloop made in California and designed by a famous yacht designer Robert Perry. For some reason that thought just popped into my head. I think it was the pictures I found this week of me sailing when I was a little younger. The boat, however, was easy to sail with all lines rigged aft, and I think I could still manage her on the bay here. In New England, the boats come out of the water and are stored in the shipyard. The water freezes in the winter which would damage the hull. The last sailing trip I made in that boat was from Mattapoisett, Massachusetts to Martha's Vineyard. That was so much fun. I do miss those days on the sea.

Youth is certainly wasted on the young. It has been raining. It has been raining. It has been raining. I suppose if it keeps up long enough to flood the west coast, I could have made it to my boat and anchored in the bay and reflect on why I am here. I don't think one ever knows just why we are put on this earth or what happens to all that thought and knowledge we have accumulated or why there is this desire to learn more. To what end? A hymn we will sing on February 4, is "You who dwell in the shelter of the Lord," and is based on Psalm 91. The chorus is one of my favorite messages. "'And I will raise you up on eagle's wings, bear you on the breath of dawn, make you to shine like the sun, and hold you in the palm of my hand."

Sometimes I imagine God lifting me up on His wings and looking down at this beautiful planet. I think the problem comes as we get closer to the surface and see the things God's creations are doing to each other. I wish He could just take us all up on His wings and stay just far enough away to see the beauty created below us. I may never get a glimpse into the purpose I was put here. I know that I keep on learning, loving, and caring. Most importantly I have an empathy for those in the world. I think back.

I was in the third grade at Chandler Elementary school. I had no idea what deep feelings were. Who does at that age. Something happened one day. I was waiting for my grandmother to pick me up. My parents were divorced and we were living with our grandparents. I think it was just before Mother's day. Walking down the sidewalk was this younger boy. I knew who he was. He was a Navajo. He was carrying some flowers and a piece of paper he had drawn and I could see he word "Mom." There was a crack in the sidewalk, and he tripped. His flowers and paper fell on the ground. I was happy there weren't a lot of others around as they would have laughed at this. He had tears in his eyes. He bent down and picked up the flowers and paper. Nothing was damaged. His gift representing his love for his mother was saved, and he continued his journey down the street.

Why am I telling you this story? As I stood there watching this happen. I also had tears in my eyes. I was nine years old. But for some unexplainable reason, I felt compassion and empathy for this boy. I somehow knew what that gift represented to him and what it would mean for his mother. That was the moment in my life, that something inside me changed. I had been lifted up to be able to see and feel the meaning of care that transcended love. My grandmother picked me up a little later and I didn't say much on my way home. However, that gift I was given that day changed the way I looked at others. For that, I remain thankful.

Keep your fork!

There was a young woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her things 'in order,' she contacted her Pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes.



She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in. Everything was in order and the Pastor was preparing to leave when the young woman suddenly remembered something very important to her.

"There's one more thing," she said excitedly..

"What's that?" came the Pastor's reply.

"This is very important," the young woman continued. "I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand."

The Pastor stood looking at the young woman, not knowing quite what to say.

"That surprises you, doesn't it?" the young woman asked.

"Well, to be honest, I'm puzzled by the request," said the Pastor.

The young woman explained. "My grandmother once told me this story, and from that time on I have always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who are in need of encouragement. In all my years of attending socials and dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, "Keep your fork." It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance!"

"So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder... "What's with the fork?" Then I want you to tell them: "Keep your fork ... the best is yet to come."

The Pastor's eyes welled up with tears of joy as he hugged the young woman good-bye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the young woman had a better grasp of heaven than he did. She had a better grasp of what heaven would be like than many people twice her age, with twice as much experience and knowledge. She KNEW that something better was coming.

At the funeral people were walking by the young woman's casket and they saw the cloak she was wearing and the fork placed in her right hand. Over and over, the Pastor heard the question, "What's with the fork?" And over and over he smiled.

During his message, the Pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the young woman shortly before she died. He also told them about the fork and about what it symbolized to her. He told the people how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them that they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either.

He was right. So the next time you reach down for your fork let it remind you, ever so gently, that the best is yet to come. Friends are a very rare jewel, indeed. They make you smile and encourage you to succeed. Cherish the time you have, and the memories you share. Being friends with someone is not an opportunity, but a sweet responsibility.

Share this to everyone you consider a FRIEND... and I'll bet this will be a message they do remember, every time they pick up a fork!

And just remember ... keep your fork!


Events being considered:

- St. Patrick's Day Dinner Vestry voted to hold this event on Saturday, 16 March..
- "Kirking of the Tartan" Celtic Celebration will have greater appeal to the community if the Celtic aspect is emphasized. Hold in October/November timeframe. Needs to be planned well ahead to get dancers/music/speakers.
- Chili Cook-Off we are considering submitting the winning chili in the Santa Cruz Boardwalk Cook-Off.
- Organ Concert initially scheduled as part of the Open House last fall. Jesse will coordinate; suggested a "keyboard" concert offering both organ and piano pieces. Ray Rischpater will assist Jesse in building a program, contacting other musicians, and identifying a date.
- Golf event/tournament Rochelle and Sharon will discuss possibilities. Joan offered to help obtain prizes.
- Event for children and adults joint activities, then separate, and return to final joint activity.
- Nativity pageant as part of Christmas celebrations for families. Adults can play roles as well as children.
- After school activities including a tutoring program.
- Harvest Dinner. Persons "sponsor" a table with décor, tablesettings, etc. Hold at Thanksgiving time.

- Seder in Easter season. Formerly held with rabbi officiating, Jewish traditional food
